

Constitutional Amendment

CHURCH OF THE NAZARENE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT BY THE
THIRTIETH GENERAL ASSEMBLY
Adopted at Indianapolis, Indiana, USA
June 2023

The Michigan District shall consider concurrence or non-concurrence (by two-thirds vote of district assembly delegates) with action of the Thirtieth General Assembly held in Indianapolis, Indiana, USA, 12-15 June 2023, amending the constitution of the Church of the Nazarene.

NOTE: New text is underlined; brackets [] indicate text to be deleted.

RESOLVED that *Manual* paragraph 15, Article of Faith XV, be amended as follows:

XV. Second Coming of Christ

15. We believe that at the end of the age the Lord Jesus Christ will be revealed as Lord of all. He will come again in glory and power to establish fully the kingdom of God that He proclaimed and initiated in His life and ministry. As the Triune God first created heaven and earth, God will renew them in the new creation where He will dwell eternally with His redeemed people. [; that w]We who are alive at His coming shall not precede them that are asleep in Christ Jesus; but [that], if we are abiding in Him, we shall be caught up with the risen saints to meet the Lord in the air, so that we shall ever be with the Lord. In that day, God, who in the cross triumphed over all evil powers, will complete His loving purposes for creation. There will be no more suffering, injustice, or death, and God will wipe away every tear.

REASONS:

We believe that at the end of the age the Lord Jesus Christ will be revealed as Lord of all. God is revealed in the person of Jesus Christ who is lord of all creation. We believe this has been and is forever true, but not fully acknowledged in the present age. In the day of His appearing, this will be fully known to all creation.

4. Nominations

The Michigan District Nominating Committee, Rev. Brad Dyrness (chairman), Rebecca Graham (secretary), Marlene Webster, Ashley Robbins, TJ Tozer, Travis Myers, Deidre Marks, Richelle Martzke met at the District office on April 29. Chairman Dyrness called the meeting to order and opened in prayer.

The following is recommended:

- 1. That all elections be by plurality vote, and that all elections take place on one ballot, with the exception of those that require a separate ballot.
- 2. That Advisory Board members be elected to three-year terms, as provided by the *Manual* (paragraph 224).
- 3. That four ministerial and four lay members of the Advisory Board be elected as provided by the *Manual* (paragraph 224).
- 4. That no incumbent may be re-nominated for the Advisory Board if he/she will have served for eight consecutive years at the time of the election. Any non-incumbent may be nominated.
- 5. That the Nominating Committee will present at least four times the number of nominees as the number to be elected in each category on the regular ballot in order to have at least twice the number of nominees as the number elected on the ballot. Those receiving the most votes from the Nominating Committee will be presented on the ballot.
- 6. That nominees shall be chosen from churches who display a consistent pattern of giving to Eternal Investment Funds.
- 7. That the nominating ballot will reflect the intention to achieve a 50% balance of leaseholders and non-leaseholders on the ILNC board. In addition, the lay and clergy representation must be equal (50% each).
- 8. Each nominee is to be contacted, and the nomination will be ratified upon acceptance of the nominee.
- 9. Ballots will be prepared for district offices and a list of the names on these ballots, with their church membership, photo and bio shall be included in the district assembly handbook.
- 10. A draft ballot will be sent to delegates prior to assembly.
- 11. Ballots will be accepted as valid if the number of votes is equal to or less than the number of positions that are to be elected.

This audit has been completed in follow -up to previous consulting arrangements with Yeo & Yeo in preparation for this audit. A copy of the audit report is available in the Michigan District Office.

The District Advisory Board has adopted a policy of conducting an external audit every three years, with the next audit scheduled to occur during the 2026-2027 church year for the financials of 2025-2026.

Church Properties Board

This year the properties board consisted of Don Pierce, Keith Kelley, Eva Schoon, and myself. We gladly served the district and reviewed just a few items for three churches on the district. The items included interior remodels, mechanical equipment, and the possible sale of a building. We carefully and prayerfully considered each request and gave our insights and suggestions to the individual churches before recommending a course of action to the district superintendent.

The properties board is glad to see our churches working hard to maintain and improve church properties to be able to serve their communities and we are happy to help in any way that we can. Please contact me if you need assistance with property issues. The request form is on the district website for you to fill out and send in to begin the process for proper district approval whenever you are contemplating a facilities related project

Ministerial Support

We, your Committee on Ministerial Support, recommend the following:

I. Ministering to Our Pastors and Ministerial Staff

- A. That our church boards do all they can to relieve the pastor from financial worry and discomfort, as well as from the need of secular employment, by striving to supply the following compensations; and that the pastor make every effort to give full time to the work of the church, not engaging in secular work except where it is absolutely necessary:
 - 1. Moving expenses for new pastor (i.e., van costs, family travel expenses, interim salary compensations, etc.).
 - 2. Adequate starting salary, not including fringe benefits (i.e., commensurate at least with starting teacher salaries in the community).
 - 3. Car reimbursement, in addition to the pastor's salary, be given.
 - 4. A Medical Plan, paying the premiums covering the pastor and family.
 - 5. Full self-employment tax reimbursement, computed on basic salary, fringe benefits, parsonage allowance and/or fair rental value of parsonage, paid at least quarterly.
 - 6. Vacations granted to all ministers on the church staff, with salary and pulpit supply paid by the church; that the dates are to be set at their discretion with the approval of the senior pastor and the church board, and the vacation time shall be based on the following formula:
 - a. at least two weeks for pastors serving the denomination 1-5 years
 - b. at least three weeks for pastors serving the denomination for 6-14 years
 - c. four weeks for pastors serving the denomination for 15-19 years
 - d. five weeks for pastors serving the denomination for 20-24 years
 - e. six weeks for pastors serving the denomination for 25 years and over
 - 7. That each local church give the week of Camp Meeting to their pastor to attend the District Camp Meeting, not counting this as part of the pastor's vacation (one week, including one Sunday).
 - 8. That churches consider offering maternity or paternity leave to pastors and staff in addition to and separately from vacation time, per Manual 116.
 - 9. That the church provide funds for mileage, baby-sitter, Housing, meals, etc., for all district and general church functions.
 - a. Official district church meetings (i.e., assembly, pastors' workshop, District Ministry Team Retreat, seminars, Camp Meeting, and pastors' revivals)
 - b. Official general church meetings (i.e., general assembly, Evangelism Conference)
 - 10. That the church provide funds for continuing pastoral education (i.e., book allowance, PALCON, Institute of Church Management, district continuing educational program, etc.).
 - 11. That all church-owned parsonages on the Michigan District be furnished with the heavy major appliances (refrigerator, range, washer and dryer, dishwasher, and such other appliances and conveniences as may be common to the local congregation).
 - 12. That the level of appreciation and respect for the ministry among the congregation be lifted by remembering the pastor, the pastor's spouse, and the parsonage children in special ways on birthdays, anniversaries, and Christmas.
 - 13. That our churches participate in Nazarene Retirement Program (tax-sheltered annuity) by contributing at least an amount equal to 5 percent of the pastor's salary; and that our pastors consider contributing additionally to the fund.

Ministerial Support (con't)

- 14. That our church boards plan a Pastor/Staff Appreciation Day suggested in October or sometime during the year.
- 15. That pastor and all staff salaries and benefits be thoroughly reviewed annually. Salary increases in cash or benefits shall be at the discretion of the church board.
- 16. That each local church consider ways of guarding needed private time for their pastor and the pastor's family to maintain and enrich their relationships. They represent the church's most valuable resource.
 - They deserve our love, our support, and our prayers. We recommend pastors take a day off each week.
- 17. That churches and pastors giving consideration to study leaves are asked to consult with the district super-intendent for guidelines in planning.
- 18. That a sabbatical plan be considered for a pastor who has served a minimum of seven years in the same church. A sabbatical plan is available through the district office, or the Clergy Development office at the GMC.

II. Ministering to Our Evangelists
(tenured, commissioned, registered, and song evangelists employed
by the local church for ministerial services)

- A. That each church board agree on minimum compensation to a called evangelist. Realizing that he/she receives no paid vacation, receives no remuneration for time lost due to sickness or seasonal inactivity, we recommend that the church board be generous in paying evangelists (i.e., two times the pastor's salary, plus cash benefits, per week) when the evangelist provides his/her own housing during the meeting, he/she be compensated for the same or consider designating a portion of the compensation as housing allowance.
- B. That our churches plan some program to underwrite the major portion of the evangelist's compensation prior to the meeting, and that added consideration be given to husband/wife teams carrying the total program.
- C. That the local church board remember with a Christmas gift the evangelists and song evangelists that have served their local church during the past year; we suggest a gift equal to 5 percent of the compensation given them.
- D. That the local church with a commissioned evangelist or a commissioned song evangelist as a member pay one-half of the evangelist's district hospitalization and one half of the evangelist's Social Security tax.

III. Ministering to Our Retiring Pastors and Evangelists (those receiving basic pension)

That the church board endeavor to express in a tangible way its love and appreciation to its retiring pastor or evangelist through ongoing assistance with medical insurance, farewell activities, paying moving expenses or a portion thereof, and a love gift of monetary value.

IV. Other Recommendations

- A. That copies of this report be sent by the district secretary to the pastor and church board secretary of each local church, and that the local church board secretary present this report to the local church board at its September meeting.
- B. That following a salary review a report be sent to the district office by the church board secretary.

Sabbatical Policy

PURPOSE OF SABBATICAL

To provide long-term pastoral staff and their family the opportunity of a sabbatical leave for the purpose of professional development, personal and spiritual renewal, rest, and visioning. By means of a sabbatical leave, the congregation wishes to express gratitude and affirmation to our pastor and family.

At the same time, it is the intent that the church will be challenged to a special time of renewal as well as an enlarged vision of its ministry.

SABBATICAL TIME FRAME FOR THE SENIOR PASTOR

A sabbatical leave of seven to thirteen weeks will be provided to the senior pastor after the completion of each seven years of consecutive full time employment.

It is preferred that the seven to thirteen week sabbatical be taken in consecutive weeks. However, a two session sabbatical could be considered, by each local church.

The scheduling of the sabbatical leave shall take into consideration the needs of the congregation, the scheduling needs from the pastor's proposal, and other pertinent concerns as may be established.

SABBATCIAL TIME FRAME FOR ASSOCIATE PASTORS

A sabbatical leave may be considered for full time associate pastors at the discretion of the senior pastor and church board. A sabbatical leave provided for an associate pastor shall follow the same guidelines as for the senior pastor and as set forth in this outline.

SABBATICAL PLANNING

The use of the seven week sabbatical will be primarily planned by the pastor and shall require church board approval. It is recommended and preferred that the sabbatical include activities and events that will carry out the purpose of the sabbatical as stated above.

The church board shall appoint a Sabbatical Committee to receive and review the pastor's proposed plan of sabbatical leave. It shall help establish specific expectations of the sabbatical and present the plan to the church board for review and approval. It shall help develop a plan for implementing the sabbatical leave and carrying on the ministry of the church in the pastor's absence.

These specifics shall be followed:

- 1. It shall be the responsibility of the <u>church</u> board to initiate the planning by setting aside funds on a regularly scheduled basis to finance a sabbatical. A budget line item should be established to track the accumulation of funds.
- 2. At the end of the Pastor's sixth year of employment, the board shall appoint a committee of a minimum of three individuals from the board and the congregation. The committee will serve from the date of receipt of the pastor's sabbatical plan until the sabbatical evaluation is completed upon the pastor's return.
- 3. At the end of the pastor's sixth year of employment, the board shall ask the pastor to prepare a sabbatical leave itinerary to be presented to the church board. The pastor's proposed plan shall be received by the Sabbatical Committee six months prior to the planned date of commencement of the sabbatical. The proposed plan should focus on the specific objectives of the leave. The proposed plan shall also outline how the pastoral duties will be carried out in the pastor's absence.

Sabbatical Policy (con't)

PROCEDURE FOR CONTINUING THE MINISTRY OF THE CHURCH DURING THE PASTOR'S SABBATICAL LEAVE

The pastor will provide a proposed plan for the continuing ministry of the church during the sabbatical. The pastor will be responsible for appointing persons from the pastoral staff or arranging for interim leadership to carry out the administrative duties, congregational care ministries, and pulpit responsibilities.

It is recommended that only normal activities and regularly scheduled events in the ministry of the church (i.e. Sunday morning, Sunday evening, and Wednesday evening service, regularly scheduled board meeting) are to be carried out.

During the sabbatical, contact with the senior pastor should be limited to the following:

- 1. Serious illness or death of a member of the congregation.
- 2. Any event that the Sabbatical Committee and the interim pastor jointly determine to be an emergency situation; and/or . . .
- 3. A specific prearranged request by the senior pastor.

FINANCING OF SABBATICAL LEAVE

- 1. The church shall make the following financial commitment during the pastor's sabbatical leave:
 - The pastor's full salary and benefits will continue. There will be no reduction of salary or benefits during the duration of the sabbatical.
- 2. Seminar or educational expenses incurred by the pre-approved sabbatical plan will be supported by the church according to professional development policies.
- 3. A sabbatical budget will be established with the amount to be approved by the church board after consideration and approval of the sabbatical plan. The budget may assist with additional expenses (e.g. travel expense).

THE PASTOR'S FAMILY DURING SABBATICAL LEAVE

The pastor and his or her spouse shall determine the role family members will take in the sabbatical leave. That role shall be included in the proposed plan for sabbatical that the pastor submits to the Sabbatical Committee for board approval.

The pastor's immediate family members may, but are not expected to, attend regularly scheduled services and/or activities. The pastor and family members shall be free to communicate with the church community as they desire.

However, to enable the sabbatical to accomplish the intended purpose, it will be requested of the congregation and the board that no direct communication be made with the pastor or the pastor's family members.

RETURN FROM SABBATICAL

Upon return from sabbatical leave, the pastor shall first meet with the Sabbatical Committee and interim pastor before re-entering his duties of ministry. A date shall be scheduled for this meeting prior to the commencement of the sabbatical leave. The purpose of the meeting shall be twofold. First, the committee and interim pastor will inform the pastor of all issues that have arisen in his absence, bring him up to date on all activities, and discuss the effect the sabbatical has had on the church. Second, the pastor may in turn give a brief oral report to the Sabbatical Committee on his activities and what he feels transpired with regard to carrying out the goals of the sabbatical.

Sabbatical Policy (con't)

The pastor and the Sabbatical Committee shall each prepare a written report at approximately one month following the pastor's return.

The first Sunday worship service following the pastor's return should be planned as a celebration of renewal for the pastor and congregation.

STIPULATIONS

- 1. Sabbatical leave will not negate any of the pastor's earned vacation. Vacation days may not be used to extend the length of sabbatical leave.
- 2. Sabbatical leave will be in addition to board approved events or seminars throughout the sabbatical year.
- 3. No more than one member of the pastoral staff may be on sabbatical leave at any one time.
- 4. No personnel shall be hired or terminated while the senior pastor is on sabbatical, unless approval is given by the senior pastor.
- 5. It is advised that district responsibilities held by Pastor or Staff be suspended during the sabbatical time, except for "end-of-year" reports.
- 6. This sabbatical leave policy shall be reviewed periodically.
- 7. The purpose of this policy is for direction and is not intended to be all conclusive. Proposed changes or additions in the above policy may be submitted to the Sabbatical Committee and presented to the church board for approval.

Treasurer's Annual Report

Dr. Sunberg, Pastor Brad, delegates, and friends of the Michigan District – Greetings

The 2023/24 fiscal year continued to experience steady growth and positive results. Total revenue was more than 10 % above budget.

We have had a number of individuals take over new to them responsibilities on behalf of the district. We again wish to thank Deidre Marks for her support and assistance during the transition to our new Business manager, Danielle Haldane. Danielle has worked diligently to make a very smooth transition, and is doing a great job for the Michigan District Finance office.

2024/25 Budget

The 2023/24 treasurer's report will show increased expenses related to the costs associated with Nazarene Youth Congress. This event occurs every four years and provides a great experience for our youth. We have seen significant changes in youth from our local congregations that have attended this event.

While we did not anticipate ILNC requiring a subsidy, the District did provide some support primarily due to timing of cash flow at the camp. The NMI, NDI, and NYI continue to support summer camps and encourage all churches to participate in them.

Just as all of our local church boards review their budgets every year, your Finance Committee and District Advisory Board reviewed last year's finances and considered the effect inflation has had with regard to future needs. Unfortunately, we were not able to make all the increases we thought would be beneficial. The Finance Committee and Advisory Board did however make allowance for some special non-recurring projects. These are to be underwritten from accumulated reserves from years when results exceeded budgets.

We continue to pray that we will have 100% participation in supporting the ministries of the Michigan District and our International Church, in finances, prayers and action.



EDUCATION FUND | OLIVET NAZARENE UNIVERSITY



Single Defined Benefit Plan





MICHIGAN DISTRICT | ETERNAL INVESTMENTS (EIF)

The MINaz District provides our pastors and staff support, accountability, leadership, and pastoral care.



A local church and pastor receive specific help with:

- Counsel and direction by the District Superintendent's Office including regular Pastoral Reviews,
 Properties Board, District Advisory Board, District Finance Team, Ministerial Studies, and Credentials
 Board along with a mentoring program.
- The District Mission Board (NMI) directs and encourages The Great Commission with opportunities in global missions, district projects, and local missions in many communities. NMI provides local church training & workshops and supports our missionaries-in-residence at summer camps and gives at Christmas time.
- The District Discipleship Board (NDI) provides Discipleship training, Bible Quizzing, Camping & Retreat Ministries, Family Camp, Workshops, etc.
- The District Youth Board (NYI) creates opportunities for students from all sized churches to participate in quality Retreats, Quizzing, Camping, and other Youth Ministries.
- All Pastors and Spouses are invited to participate in a Spring Retreat for a fraction of the actual cost, a Christmas Party is provided, and Training for Pastors at Fall Workshops including our retired pastor community.
- A District Attorney is available to local churches for legal counsel.
- The District Office is available for meetings spaces.
- o The Reserve Army Fund helps pastors and churches in financial crisis.
- o The 10% Others Grant provides grants for local ministries reaching outside their church doors.
- o The District Budget currently supports 5 employees.
- The District Advisory Board (DAB) is investing \$14,000 to support and create scholarships to students preparing for ministry.

District Assembly Finance Committee Report

It is expected that each local church pays its denominational budgets in full each year.

We, the Finance Committee, recommend the following:

- That Eternal Investment Funds (District, NDI, NYI, and NMI) be 5.5 percent of charitable donations received, excluding missions giving (W.E.F., 10 percent Approved Mission Specials, and New Church Starts). Capital Stewardship Campaigns (CSC) (see #3) need to have <u>prior approval</u> of the General Church of the Nazarene Exceptions Committee and the Michigan District Advisory Board. Funds for Eternal Investment Funds are to be sent to the Michigan District Office.
- 2. That the World Evangelism Fund for each local church is 5.5 percent, NBUSA 2.0 percent, and ONU 2.5 percent of all charitable donations received excluding missions giving (WEF and Approved Missions Giving). Each local church is encouraged to use the Global Ministries website, www.FundingtheMission.org, to assist in calculating and paying the amounts due for all Eternal Investment Funds (EIF). WEF, Approved Missions Giving, NBUSA, ONU, and District funds can be sent on the Funding the Mission website. However, ONU and District EIF funds can be given online or mailed to the Michigan District Office. Churches are encouraged to make EIF payments throughout the year (weekly, monthly, or quarterly).
- 3. A Capital Stewardship Campaign is defined as a financial fundraising campaign to raise funds for the church that is over and above the tithe and regular offerings of the donor, lasts for a specific time (no longer than 36 months), is limited to facilities intended for worship or discipleship, and is targeted for at least one of the following:

Purchase of real estate for the expressed intent of worship or discipleship *Construction* of facilities for said purposes.

Acceleration of debt reduction (beyond scheduled loan amortization) on facilities previously constructed for said purposes.

If a CSC exception is requested and approved, the first day of eligibility will be the first day in the District's fiscal year. A church whose CSC is qualified agrees that, for the duration of the CSC exception, the church will contribute the allocation percentages as prescribed in the Funding the Mission giving plan. In addition, the church agrees to a denominational allocation goal minimum equal to the average of the amount allocated over the previous three fiscal years prior to the start of the campaign. By using the previous three-year average of the local church's Funding the Mission goals, the church's goal would not be less than the three year average of these goals for the duration of the campaign, but the church could give more based on a non-CSC income growth that may occur during the CSC.

- 4. May 31 is the close of the church fiscal year, and anything received at the District Office after June 10 will not be reflected in District Assembly materials.
- 5. All churches give emphasis to our *Manual* (2023 edition), par. 32.1, which states,
 - "Storehouse Tithing. Storehouse tithing is a scriptural and practical performance of faithfully and regularly placing the tithe into that church to which the member belongs. Therefore, the financing of the church shall be based on the plan of storehouse tithing, and the local Church of the Nazarene shall be regarded by all of its people as the storehouse. All who are a part of the Church of the Nazarene are urged to contribute faithfully one-tenth of all their increase as a minimum financial obligation to the Lord and freewill offerings in addition as God has prospered them for the support of the whole church, local, district, educational, and general. The tithe, provided to the local Church of the Nazarene, shall be considered a priority over all other giving opportunities which God may lay upon the hearts of His faithful stewards, in support of the whole church."
- 6. The office of the District Treasurer shall communicate a progress report on payment of the District Unified Fund periodically to the churches.
- 7. The District Business Manager shall send a monthly report to the President/Chairperson and Treasurer of NDI, NYI, and NMI.
- 8. The ILNC Treasurer shall send a monthly report to the District Superintendent, District Treasurer, and District Finance Committee.

District Finance Committee (con't)

- 10. That any additional 9. That the District Operating Budget shall be established based on the projected amount of money that the District anticipates receiving (a.k.a. Zero-Based Budgeting). Additional non-reoccurring projects to be paid from funds accumulated over time have also been included in the 2024-2025 budget.
- 10. That any additional funds received above the projected amount will be directed to the District Account under the direction of the District Advisory Board in consultation with the District Finance Committee.
- 11. Pastors and members of churches who do not contribute to assigned allocations (WEF 5.5%, ONU 2.5%, NBUSA 2.0%, District 5.5%) are not eligible to be nominated or elected to serve on any District leadership committees or as a General Assembly delegate.
- 12. That each church be a 10 percent church for World Evangelism, which includes the World Evangelism Fund (WEF), Approved Mission Specials, and New Church Starts.
- 13. That all District auxiliary and/or boards make their request for their projected EIF budgets for the coming assembly year in writing no later than February 28 of the current fiscal year. These requests should be submitted to the District Office.
- 14. The total of honorariums for auxiliary officers may not exceed \$2,000 per auxiliary. The council of each auxiliary is to decide how to distribute this total among their officers.
- 15. That a uniform housing, travel, and per diem will be recommended for all General Assembly and General Conventions Delegates by the District Finance Committee.
- 16. That the standard reimbursement rate is based on the current IRS business use mileage rate for all authorized travel under District auspices (committees, boards, auxiliaries, etc.).
- 17. That the Reserve Army be continued with no more than four promotions made during the year.
- 18. That all monies received from the sale of property from officially inactive churches, less encumbrances, be turned over to the District Advisory Board to be used at their discretion in accordance with the 2023 *Manual* par.108.2 and 108.5.
- 19. That any group insurance plan and any necessary adjustments be left to the District Advisory Board.
- 20. That each church budget for the expenses of all their delegates including pastor and spouse, and pastoral staff, for all District conventions and activities.
- 21. That each church budget, or receive special offerings, for Nazarene Bible College and Nazarene Theological Seminary and that the money is remitted promptly to the appropriate office (see instruction in General Information section of this District journal).
- 22. That each local church treasurer submits an itemized written report to the monthly meeting of the local church board and disburses all money at the direction of the church board (see 2023 *Manual*, par.146 through 146.6, and par. 139.21).
- 23. That the local church is encouraged to invest funds in federally insured banking institutions, their equivalent, or through a licensed fiduciary broker.
- 24. Pastors shall not be a signatory on any church checking or savings account. That no member of the pastor's immediate family (spouse, children, siblings, parents) can serve as the local church treasurer without the approval of the District Superintendent and the District Advisory Board (see 2023 *Manual*, par.127), and that, furthermore, no member of the pastor's immediate family should be involved in the counting or handling of local church funds without the same approval.
- 25. That an annual audit/compilation of the treasurer's books be conducted in accordance with the *Manual* (see 2023 *Manual*, par. 139.23).
- 26. That each local church should use some type of accounting system, such as QuickBooks, and in doing so be compatible with the District software.
- 27. Recognizing the full-time minister's responsibility at retirement, we recommend that each pastor and church participate in the 403(b) of the general church. (See Ministry Support Report)
- 28. That individuals are encouraged to remember the Michigan District and Indian Lake Nazarene Camp in their wills and estate planning.
- 29. That the following items be established in the District Operations apportionment:

This year has been one of profound change and growth for our church. When I joined as pastor in January 2021, it became clear that our financial situation was more precarious than initially thought. Despite our best efforts to address the debt from our building's new addition, it became evident that selling the building was the only viable option. After 18 months on the market, we successfully closed the sale on May 30, 2024.

Losing our building has been an emotional journey, marked by uncertainty and the departure of some members. However, it has also opened new doors and strengthened our resolve. The Good Samaritan Rescue Mission in Bay City has graciously offered us their chapel for our weekly worship services. Meeting at 3:00 pm instead of our traditional morning service has required adaptation. Still, it has also provided us with a unique opportunity to immerse ourselves more deeply in the community we aim to serve.

Our presence at the mission allows us to directly engage with those in need, embodying our vision of being a church without walls—one that serves the community from within. Instead of inviting people to come to us, we are now a church of people actively working in the community.

This year also marked our third annual "Scripture in the City" event, in partnership with Narrow Path Christian Church BC. Starting on Pentecost, we read the entire Bible aloud over the city, a continuous 90-hour effort shared among our members and the broader community. Hosting this event at the Broadway Family Grill, with enthusiastic support from the owner and staff, significantly expanded our outreach. Community members and passersby joined us in reading and participating in revival worship services, creating a spirit-filled and inclusive atmosphere.

Additionally, the sale of our building has brought unexpected blessings. The buyers, Christians themselves, are opening a center to support children with autism. Learning about their mission and values during a shared dinner brought great comfort to our congregation, knowing the space will continue to serve the community in meaningful ways.

Despite the trials of the past year, we have witnessed incredible faith and resilience within our congregation. The transition has not been easy, and we faced setbacks, including a failed merger with another local church. However, our commitment to serving the community remains unwavering. Through our trials, we have become more adaptable and more determined to fulfill our mission of love, service, and outreach.

As we continue this journey, we are grateful for the steadfast support of our members and the new opportunities to serve our community. We look forward to the coming year with hope and faith, trusting that God's plan will continue to guide and bless our efforts.

This year we have expanded our ministry beyond the church doors by continuing to serve, love and be an active part in our community. We have a school that touches our church property and this year it has become known that the staff and faculty were getting badly burnt out. Our goal as a church was to encourage them and let them know that they are loved and prayed for. We ended up getting every staff and faculty member at this school an individually wrapped cookie from a bakery, a small arrangement of flowers, and a 10 dollar gift card with a thank you card.

Another way we are expanding our ministry, is also by giving more attention to the inward focused programs at our church by more effectively delegating tasks. While this sounds like the opposite of community engagement, I believe this is necessary for us to reach our community more effectively. Our church is made up of almost entirely new people (there are only 3 people who have been here longer than 5 years). While this is a huge blessing, it also creates challenges because it is easy for the church mind set to become "I attend this church" rather than "this is my church." Our goal is to make it so 100% of the church is doing 100% of the ministry within the church. We believe this will be a huge way that we expand discipleship, teens, kids and our community engagement. Instead of having a few leaders, we want to have many within our church that bring God's kingdom in Buchanan as it is in heaven.

Finally, looking forward we are in the very early stages of planning to start a coffee ministry at our church. Buchanan is a lower income area and does not have a ton of places for people to gather, have meaningful conversations, and enjoy it over a drink of coffee or a snack for free. We are thinking of just having everything be donation based or free. We believe this would be an amazing way for us to host our community and show them they are loved.

As we look at what God has done this past year we are beyond grateful and look forward to how He will continue to move.

"We can make our plans, but the Lord determines our steps," (Proverbs 16:17, NLT). I am a big fan of planning. In fact, I entered my new assignment at Eaton Rapids armed with inspiration from Scott Daniels' book *The First Hundred Days*. My plan was to not make plans for a while...and I failed...or, perhaps, the Lord determined different steps for our church.

We moved to Eaton Rapids over Labor Day weekend, the next weekend a group of us went to the Convoy of Hope training, and the weekend after that we were at the Farmer's Market using Little Debbie snacks and grape Propel to make connections with our new neighbors.

God directed us to a new mission and a five-year vision for getting out of our church building and into the community, expanding not only where, but also who we reach. We are a church leading people through and to Jesus one at a time. We endeavor to love our neighbors – those where we live, learn, work, and play. We're also placing intentional emphasis on building community partnerships that will help us reach the two largest and least churched demographics in our community: children (birth – high school) and young adults (18-25).

Those partnerships include the local school district, the city parks and rec department, the local nonprofit called Teen Space, and Convoy of Hope. We're currently in the first of a four-year plan to allocate 10% of our total operating budget to blessing Eaton Rapids. In addition to the 2.5% we budgeted for this year, we applied for the district Others Grant and the Blessing Our Communities grant through the Cycle of Resurgence initiative. We're using these grant funds and a portion of our budget to host Family Fun Nights every Wednesday this summer.

We had a chance to volunteer during two community events already this summer – running a craft table at "Art in the Park" and supervising the Kid Zone at the City Fourth of July Celebration. In the fall, we will deploy volunteers into two elementary schools and Teen Space at least two days per week, building our way to a daily kingdom presence with students in first through twelfth grade.

We can't wait to see what the Lord has determined for our next steps!

We have stewardship groups, six small groups from our church. Those groups are the ones who do the visits. They visit other church members and then each group has a day that they meet in their area, or zip codes. They have a service in their area with those who live close to them, and they visit neighbors. Sometimes they meet and they have some coffee or tea then they can talk a little bit and then they can pray or have a small Bible Study in their home group. So that's how we reach our neighbors.

We also invite neighbors and also other teams. It's the pastoral group that is a team and sometimes we use it to track numbers so we can visit especially the newcomers. We have an agreement with Bethany Christian Services where we sign a contract with them every year so if they have newcomers we have plans to go there and visit them and try to help them with whatever they need.

Maybe sometimes they need some clothes, especially in the wintertime. We can give this announcement to the church and the church can contribute some clothes if they have some, or if they have a little money to give we can go shopping and buy some clothes for them.

The other things we do is help them with transportation. That's a big issue. Most of them do not drive or even know how to drive. They don't have a car yet, they don't have a license yet, so we need to help them. Even in our church, we still have those people that don't have transportation. In my garage, I have traffic cones that I can sometimes put those cones out and I can train them how to park and to drive so maybe in the future they can start driving themselves. We take them to doctors' appointments when they have them. We also help them when they first come and don't have the documents they need. We take them to DHS to apply for their documents, to apply for Medicaid and get a Social Security card.

Right this moment we have three guys in our church, and one is walking into the church to get help with transportation to DHS. People are helping with other organizations that help refugees. We help people if they are newcomers, if they go to another church, or if they are members of our church. Some might not be here for long, but they don't have the skills to teach them English. We need to have people who help us teach them to translate Swahili to English so they can get a license from the government. We go with them so we can help translate. Once they get their permit, we can help them learn to drive.

Those are the things we do every day, every day. Just this morning I came from the roads helping some people here. That's what we do.

Another way we have blessed our community this year is through our annual diaper drive. We had a goal to bring 1200 diapers to the church to donate them to St Gianna's Baby Boutique. They offer a selection of new and gently used items for infant and toddler care at no cost. We ended up donating over 1300 diapers!

This year of 2023 has been a learning adventure for the Grand Rapids West church as we strive to reach out to the lost and equip the body of Christ. Certainly! Expanding into the community beyond church doors was an essential part of our ministry to fostering meaningful connections and making a positive impact. Here are some ways the church has been involved:

- Outreach Programs: At the church level, we create some cells (Brother's Keepers) that aim to keep everyone closer like in a small group. This is the result of programs that address specific community needs, such as job placement, literacy, and visitations. These initiatives demonstrate the spirit of caring which helps build trust.
- **Partnerships:** We collaborate with other organizations, businesses, and government agencies such as Kent County Children and Family's Department, Bethanie, Union in Action, Caribbean Children, and more. These joint efforts have amplified the impact we make on the lives of others and created lasting changes.
- Events Beyond Sundays: Soccer is one of the programs that the church has done in partnership with the Lansing Int. Church of the Nazarene including another Haitian Church in the area. Culturally, soccer unified Haitians and broke barriers of denominations, and social classes. It's just a celebration. Haitians and organizations working in Haiti have been invited and show up to celebrate Haitian Flag Day (May 18).
- Hospital and Home Visits: Not only at the church level, but Individuals from the church, perform Regular visits to hospitals, nursing homes, and assisted living facilities. Singing, praying, and spending time with those in need bring comfort and joy.
- **Community Meals:** On every major occasion, like Mother's Day, the Church offers free meals open to everye. We have received also some bags from an Organization in Lansing which we distribute occasionally. This is a simple way to connect and share fellowship with those in our community.
- **Migrants Support:** With the flux of migrants arriving from Haiti, the church has been overwhelmed by the numerous requests for help. The Church partnered with some Rental management properties to facilitate the rent process for those who cannot meet the requirements yet to qualify for housing.
- Youth Project: Individuals from the church have received some clothes which we distribute and individuals from the church have contributed largely in clothing donations. Also, the youth group gathered at booling place this year where they engage in social networking.

Greetings Dr. Carla Sunberg, Rev. Brad Dyrness, Michigan District Assembly Delegates and Friends,

This is my 17th report to this Assembly, and I am excited to report the good news of how God is using the family at Holt Naz to reflect his Kingdom as He forms, shapes, and empowers us to share Him with our world. This past year we served 40 Families, consisting of 77 adults and 54 children, through our Blessings Pantry. With our Benevolence Ministry we were able to help several families with gas - enabling them to get to work, doctor appointments, and interviews. We also gifted a community family with baby items for their newborn and provided a care basket of snacks for a community member whose young child was in the hospital. Sycamore Elementary Care is our group that connects us to the elementary school on the Tree Streets of Holt (In 2023 we committed to pray and care for the people on the Tree Streets). This fall we were able to bless the staff of Sycamore Elementary with backpacks filled with teacher supplies. Throughout the year volunteers have helped encourage kids during mileage club, participated in their Trunk or Treat, as well as their field day, and provided breakfast for Teacher Appreciation. In the fall we participated with the Holt Community Trunk or Treat – meeting old friends and new as more than 800 kids collected candy and tattoos. We opened our building on Tuesdays for PLAY- an opportunity for parents or caregivers to bring children birth through pre-K to connect with others in a safe play environment for the children. We also participated in our community's National Night Out with games, a pre-school play area, and an inflatable. We began Table Tuesday, where a free dinner is offered for connection with those in our community. While invitation by someone within the church brought the most visitors, we did see two families drop in from our Facebook invites. In addition to our ministries, our pastoral team has made it their priority to get our name out into the community through marketing. This meant actively sharing information about our community and connections ministries through our website and community Facebook groups as well as our own Facebook page. Through our Blessings Pantry, Fall Break Adventure Camp/VBS, Sycamore Elementary Care, PLAY, National Night Out, and Table Tuesday – we are opening doors for connection with those in our community. This past year we saw 29 new visitors to our campus and 14 of those have consistently attended an in-person worship service. Our desire is to be a body of believers where people know they belong and are provided a safe place for them to grow in their relationship with God and one another.

Now, in that time, every seat has not been occupied in both of our services. In fact, in one of the services we haven't even been close. That being said, the other service has been approaching capacity and at times spilling into overflow space. This has been a good problem to have, but still one that needed to be addressed. If we want our people to partner with God to reach their neighbors (in the places they live, work, play, and learn), then we need to make sure there's room to receive them.

We began a series in January called Room to Grow. It led up to a shift to three Sunday services. We shared that this would mean change for all of us. But if we only saw it as a change to our Sunday routine, then we would miss out. Instead, we saw it as an opportunity to grow in our devotion to God and one another, in our engagement with what goes on in/through our church, and in our participation in God expanding his kingdom. It was an opportunity for all of us to become more together as God was doing a new thing in our midst. The order of devotion, engagement, and participation is important. It is an inside-out movement. God, do it in me, in us, and in them.

This has been well-received by our people, and a good move overall. Our staff and their teams have shined! I believe that the work has just begun. It is very much unfinished. Even as I re-typed the words above, which were included in our messages and publications, I am drawn to them again. To say that I ache for them to come to fruition would not be an overstatement.

Author and activist Christine Cain says, "Healthy things grow, and growing things change. Dear friends in Christ,

Lansing Intl Church of the Nazarene is pleased to share these experiences on the spiritual growth of the church and the impact made in the community in the few lines.

First, in October 2023, we organized a Training Seminar on Mission and Evangelism with the different departments of the church. We have shown the different methods for evangelizing including the Door-to-door method and the collective or mass method. Although there is no unique technique that is best for the growth of the Church, it all depends largely on the circumstances of the people who will receive the Word of God. However, it is important to take the time to analyze the situation and find a method appropriate to each situation. President Joe Biden's program is a concrete example. Most of the people who are just settling in the area have been contacted by our church members and informed us about that. Our responsibility is to see them at home to introduce them to our congregation. Additionally, we invite them to take part, and we give them calls asking them how they are and how they see the assembly. Door-to-door is interesting because the person is ready to talk to us and even explain their problems.

Second, people who come from other countries such as Brazil, Chile, etc., upon arriving in the area, don't have anything even to pay for their accommodation. Last year, the Nazarene Mission gave very useful help. We will say with honesty, that this offer was useful because people were hoping to receive a grant each month from the church, which helped them fill some of the gaps.

Third, Soccer is one of the programs that the church has done in partnership with the Grand Rapids West including another Haitian Church in the Lansing area. Culturally, soccer unified Haitians and broke barriers of denominations, and social classes. It's just a celebration.

Finally, one of the elements we share is that each member reaches at least one person in their neighborhood, at school, and even at work. The home and hospital visits carried out are very effective, the testimonies are exact proof.

What makes the job prosperous is that everyone is courteous, warm, and smiling when we are together. This gives visitors the taste of being a member of this Church and this gives the possibility to the church to extend beyond the doors in the area.

We have a field that needs to be harvested, and we are actively getting outside our walls to build relationships and share the love of Jesus to the community around us. An example of this is one of our weekly Connect Groups meets at a restaurant and has befriended the waitress. They have spent time praying for her and given her gifts when she had a baby.

We also are part of Lansing city council as a prayer advisor to the mayor. Another way we have expanded into the community is by hosting many events for our local schools and allowing our facility to be used by community sports teams, which has built a community outside of our weekly services of people who know SouthNaz cares and is available. Our ONU at SouthNaz is also another avenue that we are using to expand outside of our church walls. We continue to invite the neighborhood to family outreach events like Trunker Treat, VBS, and Spring Spectacular. God is continuing to bless SouthNaz in many ways and stretch us to get outside of our comfort zones and the walls of the church. I am excited and can't wait to see where He leads SouthNaz in the coming year as we continue to expand into the community beyond our church doors.

It is a privilege to bring my second report on behalf of Lansing Woodview Church of the Nazarene.

God is moving at Woodview! The year began with us recognizing our neighborhood. Woodview is uniquely positioned on Lansing's north side. We have a Lansing address but find ourselves in the southeast corner of Dewitt township on the southern edge of Clinton County. For years we had struggled to identify "our community." Finally, it struck us that our community has a name, what DeWitt Township calls the Valley Farms district, and we are working to be a church for the Valley Farms district.

For several years we have been establishing ourselves as a community presence through outreach events. Our outreach philosophy focuses on building relationships for a Kingdom impact. We practice corporately what we hope to do individually in building relationships through hospitality and service. We held 10 events this year including outdoor game nights, indoor games nights, outdoor movie night, Trunk-or-Treat, Community Thanksgiving Dinner, and VBS. Every event we host includes free food, a chance to win a Meijer gift card, and we have our clothes closet open. Each year our community presence grows, we know our neighbors better, and we meet needs in our community through our clothes closet and through our local compassionate ministry fund.

Summer was particularly busy with monthly outdoor game nights, our first VBS in many years, and welcoming an Anglican congregation into our facility. In July a local Anglican congregation reach out about renting a portion of our facility and in September we celebrated their arrival with a joint service. Their arrival marked an answer to prayer both in better utilizing our facility and providing much needed income. In August, we held a VBS attaching our August outdoor game night with our VBS so we could connect with the families of the students who attended VBS. We also were able to meet and help an immigrant family from India who had only been in the country a couple of weeks.

Fall brought about our biggest community events including our outdoor movie night and Trunk-or-Treat. These events were only possible through the generous support of several businesses in our community. As God has called us, so God continues to provide. November marked our 2nd annual Community Thanksgiving Meal and the 2nd anniversary of the opening of our new reimagined clothes closet. After years of struggle and many attempts our clothes closet has finally taken root as a community resource, meeting needs, and welcoming community investment. In January we resumed our monthly outreach events with indoor board game nights. Each month, January through May, we held events on the third Saturday of each month. Again, we continued to grow in our presence, building new relationships, and meeting needs.

In the coming year we are looking forward to continuing to reach out into our Valley Farms community and following God into our neighborhood. We believe God is calling us, as Jeremiah 29:7 states, to "seek the peace and prosperity of the city" to which God has called us "because if it prospers, you too will prosper." We have money set aside to meet needs in our community and are exploring where God is calling us to do so. We are seeking the peace and prosperity of Valley Farms in Jesus name! May God's Kingdom come, and God's will be done at Woodview and in Valley Farms as it is in heaven.

I chose Connection, if we don't connect with people, community, you won't succeed.

To restart an Indian Church, being a big white guy isn't isn't practical. White people are at the bottom of their acceptance list. We couldn't get a vote for me to come to Mt. Pleasant, because I was white. I started with four Indians and one hillbilly. All finances and records were never given up by former the pastor. Not the way to begin, but the Call of God told me to go. In the early days it was Blanket Dog & Soup Benefits to reach the community on massive funerals for Tribal members. I knew the knife was an Indian cultural gift for friendship, which I had used in the Weseyan Church. At Faith Indian all my men have a pocket knife. If I have a man come 2 -3 weeks, I go "one on one" with him. It makes a great impression on a man. In 2007 I preached a weekend meeting at Lakota Memorial Nazarene Church in South Dakota. I gave 110 pocket knives to them. Some of my new men have been saved this year, some came to the altar , some being by themselves. Twelve people were saved this year, seven to be baptized, two came recently to surrender themselves and be Sanctified.

Connections must come from leadership for the lay people to see and understand.

MPNazarene District Assembly Handbook Report 2023/2024 year

These are good days in Mount Pleasant. This is a church that truly loves God and one another. They show up for each other in difficult times, and celebrate with one another in the good times. The people of MPNaz have a hunger to know God and to love him more.

They also have a hunger to know one another and love one another more. This year MPNaz received an "Others Grant" from the Michigan District for \$5000. This money was given to support a Nazarene Compassionate Ministry Center that was founded in the basement of the church ten years ago. Clothing INC has long outgrown the space that was available in the church and now operates closer to downtown Mt. Pleasant. The mission of Clothing INC is simple: give free clothing to anyone in need. This mission is carried out by volunteers from our church and partnering churches who desire to make Christ known to all who receive the services that Clothing INC offers. May is the month each year that Isabella County United Way offers a matching grant for all funds that are donated to Clothing INC (up to \$15k), so we opted to have the "Others Grant" given through that channel. It is incredible what God will do when the Spirit nudges someone and they respond in obedience. Over the last decade Clothing INC has served over 40,000 guests. This all started with someone saying YES to the audacious prompting of the Holy Spirit.

MPNaz and Clothing INC are separate entities, legally speaking, but the two are inseparable. On any given day at Clothing INC you will find 2-5 people from MPNaz sorting clothing, straightening up the racks, or helping guests find what they need. The founders of Clothing INC are all members and regular attenders of MPNaz, the current executive director is a member of MPNaz, and I serve as the Vice President of the Clothing INC board. Compassionate ministry is in the DNA of the Church of the Nazarene, and I am happy to see that lived out through the hands of the people of MPNazarene Church.

It has been an exciting year at the church as well. We have seen new families come for a visit, and most of them keep coming. This church is truly a Kingdom outpost, and I am humbled and honored to be their pastor. I am learning so much from the good people of MPNazarene Church.

Finally, we've been praying for a drummer to join our worship band on Sunday mornings. Two weeks ago, one of our members said he felt led to volunteer to play drums and started last week!

The Lord is certainly working at Okemos Church of the Nazarene, and I feel humbled to lead these wonderful people on their journeys of faith and trust in the Lord, Jesus Christ.

The week around Pentecost Sunday provides a great snapshot of life at Owosso City Church. On the Saturday before Pentecost, we hosted a baby shower for a family with teenaged children and a surprise baby on the way. This family is under-resourced in every way. We first met them 12 years ago when we began working at Pleasant Valley Trailer Park.

On Monday, we learned that a young father in our neighborhood had died by suicide and we reached out to offer support to the family.

On Tuesday, we hosted a funeral dinner for a family with whom we are connected because of our work in the community. Following the funeral dinner, we had our weekly Table Tuesday at the trailer park. First Baptist Church prepared the meal that week. As often as possible, we try to bring other churches to experience the work we do there. They left, in their words, "honored and humbled" to share a meal with this community.

On Wednesday, a group of gamers met at City Church to play board games and our local domestic violence shelter used the building, as they always do, for their board meeting.

On Thursday, inside the building we were preparing a fundraising dinner for Shiawassee Hope, the non-profit associated with City Church. Outside the building, Bruce was installing a Narcan dispenser provided to us by the local Health Department. Bruce started attending City Church about 5 years ago after his daughter found Christ at City Church while she was recovering from a meth and heroin addiction.

Thursday afternoon, a teacher who attends City Church was out at the trailer park leading a reading club for elementary students. Her work throughout this past year has made a significant impact on the reading levels of these children who live with so much trauma.

Thursday evening, we hosted the fundraising dinner, bringing over 90 people from all walks of life to learn about the work we do in the community.

Not counting Sunday worship, about 268 people from the community came into our church during that one week.

In December, we received an Others Grant from the district to assist with the Shiawassee Hope Co-pay Christmas store. The store, which is set up in City Church, assisted 80+ families and over 300 children. Dozens of community members donated and volunteered to make this happen.

If you look at our church income and Sunday attendance, you will know just how big our God is.

We have had to restart our offerings for toddlers in our early service. We just completed our "Foundations" Sunday School class for new believers with as many as 12 in attendance. I am challenged and humbled that God has entrusted us to the care of these that He is calling to Himself.

Over the years Perry Nazarenes have found many ways to be present in our community. This year, we had a dozen individuals from our church serve in our local food bank, meeting with clients, shopping for groceries and serving on the board. Our youth group has also made numerous shopping trips to pick up groceries. In October, we passed out 1000 cookies as a part of the Perry homecoming tailgate event. Following the lead of Chap Naz, we partnered with Kids Hope USA, to provide mentors to the local school. Kids Hope believes that all children matter to Jesus and that the church is uniquely called and equipped to care for children. After prayer and conversation with our church leadership, in January we began this new initiative with four mentors in the Perry Elementary School. We look forward to increasing our care for children this next school year. WMU students received a bag with information about the church, some giveaways and a ticket for transportation to the church on the Sunday of their choosing. We had an incredible day of interaction and conversation with all the students who stopped by our booth.

We also had the opportunity to set up a hot chocolate and donut give away during the cold months. We set up our church signs and offered free donuts and hot cocoa if they would simply choose a question out the jar and answer it. Some of the questions were about their experience at school or about themselves, but many of them were questions that could open up conversations about spiritual matters.

We met so many students who appreciated this kind gesture. I was surprised and amazed at how willing, open and honest students were about their experiences, both spiritual and non-spiritual. To be honest, I am ashamed that it took me this long to recognize this openness. It was such an amazing time. We are hoping to offer these experiences more often in the year to come.

We had three students start to attend during the school year. Two of them joined a small group and one of those two decided to join our mission trip to Native American Christian Academy this summer. It is my hope that this small open door will be flung wide open in the year to come.

In 2023-24, Portland Church of the Nazarene intentionally sought to be more outward-oriented, desiring to be not only a praying, connecting, and strengthening body, but one that is also expanding its ministry beyond the church doors and into the community. Accordingly, we began promoting the monthly global emphases established by our District NMI Council, so we could learn more and better participate in initiatives such as Care and Connection, Alabaster, Jesus Film Harvest Partners, etc.

Additionally, we introduced monthly local emphases that would allow us to better meet needs in our local context. Each month we selected one of the schools in our community and committed (1) to pray daily for the faculty or staff—each person received one or more name cards with a staff member's name, title, and email address; (2) to send at least one encouraging note or email; and (3) to donate items specifically requested by the principal, i.e., K-cups for classrooms, snacks for the teachers' lounge, small candies and gifts for student appreciation, etc. We even had the opportunity to serve breakfast in one school and to set up an end-of-the-day dessert bar in another. Of course, we knew that these tangible items of love and appreciation would eventually run out, but our primary aim was to provide prayer, hope, and encouragement that would last long after they did!

In an effort to continue serving our community, we also began partnering with Convoy of Hope, a faith-based organization with a driving passion to feed the world through children's feeding initiatives, community outreach, and disaster response. To assist us with community outreach, Convoy of Hope freely gave us hundreds of items, with the only stipulation being that we would also give it away at no cost. With the items we received from Convoy of Hope, we were able to pack 48 lunchboxes with more than 25 individually packaged snacks each and donate them to our local elementary schools. What's more, we were able to use these supplies to meet several individual needs, and we used the remaining supplies to host an appreciation dinner for the families in our community who regularly use our indoor children's playground (Taggart's Playground). We would highly recommend other churches to consider partnering with Convoy of Hope!

Lastly, we participated in "I Love My City" for the first time in several years. On Sunday, April 28th, we met at the church for prayer and a breakfast potluck and then spent the remainder of our morning serving our community. We had several individuals stay at the church, where they potted flowers and wrote letters of encouragement to be delivered at a later time. We also had a team walking the river trail picking up trash. And we had our largest group spreading mulch on one of our elementary school's playgrounds. We believe that we become more like Jesus by living like him rather than simply learning about him, and this was a great opportunity to follow in the footsteps of our Lord and Savior, for whom service was a priority!


We enjoy serving together in proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus. We move forward in the trust that His Kingdom is ours to seek and to build.

This life of grace shows up in how the church body continues to welcome & love-well the shelter guests that join us each Sunday. Gratiot County Hope House is a primary focus of our church body as the shelter is housed in the church building; so we have a regular & consistent connection to the guests. Each week some of the guests make their way into the formal parts of our services. This church body has consistently welcomed them as their own. So much so that one recent guest, as she found sustainable housing and moved out of the shelter said that she doesn't know where she'd be without her "church family" [her words].

This is what it means to be one who welcomes the widow, the orphan, the homeless, the refugee, the one who has nothing. The truth is, it's pretty tough to build a church on this kind of population. However, we're called not to be successful, but called to be faithful. So faithful we shall be.

Sparta Naz is grabbing hold of the phrase, "bless our community." Over the past year, we have been diligently trying to stretch ourselves into our community in meaningful ways with the presence of Christ. There are a few noteworthy efforts that are gaining some ground as we intentionally look outside of our walls.

First, we have a group called "Disciple Builders" that is working within our community to repair homes and do tasks that people can't afford to do or are not able to do themselves. These projects are done for free, and each person that is helped by Disciple Builders is prayed for and connected with. So far, we have installed siding on a shed, repaired sub-floor, fixed plumbing, cleaned up a camp, delivered trash from a mobile home community to the village clean up days, and installed a wheelchair ramp. And the requests for work to be done just keep coming in. This has been a very meaningful ministry to connect with our community and provide intentional service as the hands and feet of Jesus.

In our local elementary school, we are starting a partnership with Kids Hope USA in which we will be participating in one to one mentoring with Kindergarten through 2nd graders weekly. Again, this is a step outside of our walls and into the community of children at Ridgeview elementary. Our mentors are currently going through training, and will begin mentoring in the fall.

The last new effort to get out into our community is the adoption of a dog park downtown. As it is, this dog park doesn't have the greatest reputation for being maintained. And so in an effort to bless our community and to create relationships with those that frequent the dog park, we have decided to keep it up and improve it. This ministry is just getting off the ground as well.

Overall, we are excited about the ways that God is moving at Sparta Naz. We are training our eyes to see our community and we are using our hands and feet to become a blessing to our community by the grace of God. We hope and pray that through our willingness to be a blessing to our community, our community will come to know Jesus.



TRNaz (Three Rivers Church of the Nazarene) continues to be a place where the community is welcome in, as well as a place where people are, outwardly, community minded. One of the specific ways that we have reached out to our community beyond our "church doors" is by opening our doors to the needs of families in crisis who need a place to meet, who have been legally separated, so that, hopefully, parent and child (or parents and children) can be reconciled back to one another. We host "supervised visits," semi-regularly (as caseworkers have need) here at TRNaz with the hope of providing a safe space, as well as a time of intercessory praying, for ALL those who come.

A second specific way that we have reached out to our community beyond our "church doors" is through the ongoing reach of our Foster Care Closet, Ellie's Closet. It has become an extremely useful resource (sadly), that helps to meet the immediate and long-term needs of foster children and their Foster Care family. We are sad the need is so high, but we are grateful to be able to stand in a gap and show them ALL unconditional love.

A third specific way that TRNaz continues to reach out to the community beyond our "church doors" is through our BAB Fund (Be A Blessing Fund). The fund was created and setup, at the beginning of 2020, for the sole purpose of meeting financial needs of people in our community, wherever and whatever they may be, who find themselves unable to get help elsewhere or provide for themselves. The BAB Funds aim is that if there is a need, and we have money available, we are blessed to be a blessing to meet that need. Working with our County agencies, as well as other churches, we seek to provide help for people of the community in the best way that we can. To date, we are averaging just about \$20,000 in giving each year, but it's not WE who gets the credit or the glory for what has been accomplished. God is blessing us, and the people who give so faithfully to this fund (both inside and outside our own church family), and if we give, because He gave (no strings attached), we believe He will continue to make His way through this funds impact.

Lastly, our church partners with other churches in the Three Rivers Community area to provide a dinner meal, once or twice a week, for ANYONE who chooses to come and eat. The serving doesn't take place at our church, but at a local church IN town so that access is as reasonable as possible. Many from our church family have served at the "Soup Pot," happily greeting and caring for the folks who come. It's much more than just providing food though. Friendly greetings and good conversations are also part of what makes the impact positive and God-honoring. He loves the people who come, and so do we!!!

We created a mission statement many years ago and it continues to be our driving directive, empowered by the Holy Spirit who continues to make it relevant, "Consistently sharing the love of Jesus." We take this mission very seriously! Jesus loves us, and ALL, but chooses to make use of us in sharing it with the world. We, however, take no credit and no glory for any of the good that's done. If it weren't for Jesus, who gave us the GREATEST Good possible, we'd never possess a heart's desire to love people like Him.

Every Sunday we pray, "Father, we ask for nothing more than You can give, but... we ask for nothing less." May God be glorified always, and may we stay surrendered, and so made useful, to how He chooses to give to us and through us!!!
